A reading from Genesis

So he said, 'I am Abraham's servant. The Lord has greatly blessed my master, and he has become wealthy; he has given him flocks and herds, silver and gold, male and female slaves, camels and donkeys. And Sarah my master's wife bore a son to my master when she was old; and he has given him all that he has. My master made me swear, saying, "You shall not take a wife for my son from the daughters of the Canaanites, in whose land I live; but you shall go to my father's house, to my kindred, and get a wife for my son."

'I came today to the spring, and said, "O Lord, the God of my master Abraham, if now you will only make successful the way I am going! I am standing here by the spring of water; let the young woman who comes out to draw, to whom I shall say, 'Please give me a little water from your jar to drink,' and who will say to me, 'Drink, and I will draw for your camels also'—let her be the woman whom the Lord has appointed for my master's son."

'Before I had finished speaking in my heart, there was Rebekah coming out with her water-jar on her shoulder; and she went down to the spring, and drew. I said to her, "Please let me drink." Then I bowed my head and worshipped the Lord, and blessed the Lord, the God of my master Abraham, who had led me by the right way to obtain the daughter of my master's kinsman for his son.

'Now then, if you will deal loyally and truly with my master, tell me; and if not, tell me, so that I may turn either to the right hand or to the left.'

And they called Rebekah, and said to her, 'Will you go with this man?'

She said, 'I will.'

So they sent away their sister Rebekah and her nurse along with Abraham's servant and his men. And they blessed Rebekah and said to her, 'May you, our sister, become thousands of myriads; may your offspring gain possession of the gates of their foes.'

Then Rebekah and her maids rose up, mounted the camels, and followed the man; thus the servant took Rebekah, and went his way.

Re-opening our Churches

Following on from the announcement by the Welsh Government that churches in Wales are now able to reopen for private (personal) prayer, consideration has been given to the opening of churches in the Cowbridge Benefice. This is not entirely straightforward as there are a number of sensible but fairly strict conditions that will need to be met to minimise any risk to those visiting churches.

It has however now been agreed by the PCC that, initially, we will work towards opening just two churches in the Benefice in the near future; Holy Cross and St John the Baptist Church, Llanblethian. The current plan is that these churches will open for an hour on two days of each week as follows:

Holy Cross – 10 am to 11 am each Thursday and 4 pm to 5 pm each Sunday.

St John the Baptist – 10 am to 11 am each Wednesday and 2 pm to 3 pm each Sunday.

The Church Coordinators and Church Committees of these churches are now working through the guidelines and risk assessments which is necessary before the permission of the Archdeacon is sought to proceed with an opening.

One of the conditions is that when a church is open a minimum of two volunteers will need to be present to open and close the church, direct those visiting and carry out cleaning. This role, however, can only be carried out by volunteers who are not in a vulnerable group. Vulnerable groups currently include those over 70 years of age or those who are self-isolating or supporting people who are shielding. 

Digital Giving

Several people have been asking about how they can support our churches financially at this time. (Many, of course, are already doing so through their standing order arrangements.) To that end, we have set up a way giving by text in the same way that many charities do when they have an appeal on television. From next Sunday (21st) we'll be including an Offertory in the service in the usual place. We recognise that many people are facing financial uncertainty, and we don't want to add any pressure: we seek to follow the biblical principle of giving, as each is able. The text that we will display is as follows:

The Offertory

At this point in a normal church service, the plate would be passed around the congregation.

Living wage for Care Workers



Tabitha writes:

I'm a Care Worker in Wales and have just come off my night shift from the **care home. I've been back on the frontline after several weeks ill with Covid-19.**

It is a tough job, made even tougher because hundreds of thousands of care sector staff like me do it on the minimum wage and on zero hour contracts.

Back in April when I was ill it was really hard. I had to rely on food donations to get through the month. I care for our residents, but it is so demoralising when the pay is so low.

I'm angry. But I also have hope. I am organising with Citizens UK and a powerful alliance of faith groups, Trade Unions and schools. We have joined together to urge Boris Johnson's Government to properly fund the social care sector to ensure every worker gets the real Living Wage.

Very soon, the Government will announce the next set of financial measures as we start to come out of the immediate Covid-19 lockdown.

We are petitioning Health Secretary Matt Hancock MP to raise the pay of care sector staff – over half of whom are below the real Living Wage [1].

As the Government forms new plans to help sectors hit by Covid-19, let's convert the doorstep clapping for key workers into a positive change! <u>Please Sign Our Petition - click here</u>

We don't ask for pity, we just ask for a Living Wage and reliable hours. Not just to work to survive but to live and thrive. By standing with me, Citizens UK and hundreds of other care workers you can make a big difference.
